Dear Parents

Some of you may have heard on the news the terrible story of a young teen from northern Sydney who was lured overseas by a criminal. She made contact with him on social media and the result was both heartbreaking and distressing for her and her parents. How could such a shocking thing happen? - I can hear you say- but it did and it does happen to so many children around Australia.

As I have said before the dilemma for parents is that you recognise that the internet is an amazing tool for learning and for self motivated learners is opens up the 'treasures of the universe' in its potential to teach knowledge and skills on a myriad of topics.

One of the most alluring features of technology for all of us, but particularly for this generation, is its ability to connect them with others, at anytime, anywhere from any device. 11 and 12 year olds and young teens live for the ability to connect and being able to do this privately with whom they wish is a 'luxury' we did not have in our youth.

Understandably I hear parents explaining that they are very frightened of their children using technology. Issues such as that referred to above as well as cyberbullying, developing a negative internet reputation, e-security, excessive internet use, identity theft and scams, unwanted contact, and the complications of social networking, are real concerns and need to be addressed.

I put to you however that as a parent, the precautions and supports that you give to your children in the physical world are no different in essence from those in the 'cyberworld'. Children still need strict guidance and supervision when they are on and off the computer, phone or ipad and this begins from a very young age. Communication and supervision is key!

Over the years I have seen an increase in the number of children who have access to smart phones as it is a means to be able to keep in contact with the children after school. The message is clear however, children of primary school age must never use the internet unsupervised. As they get older they often pressure parents by complaining that everyone in their class has either access to certain social media sites or own computers for bedroom use. It is always up to the parents of course, however a good guiding question is, "Does my child have the necessary experience, knowledge and skills to make an informed decision, especially if they find themselves in a complex situation?' The answer to this question will determine your action. Talking to your children about what can happen and how to handle it is very important as children need to know if and when they need your support. It would be good if they feel comfortable telling you what is happening to them at all times, especially in the teenage years. Remaining calm, not jumping to conclusions and being a good listener and communicator when they do this, will encourage them to discuss worries with you.

Cybersafety continues to be an important community focus. Last year children in Kindergarten, Years One and Two, received a copy of the **Child Safety Handbook** produced by NSW Police Legacy in consultation with The Protective Behaviours Consultancy Group of NSW. Fully supported by former NSW Commissioner of Police Andrew Scipione, this resource aims to raise awareness about the risks to children and the steps that can be taken to protect them and keep them safe. INTRODUCING NEW ATTENDANCE CERTIFICATES

Improving student attendance has been a focus for Term One with some pleasing results for many students. This term, commencing

in Week 2 children who have been able to attain 100% attendance for 5 weeks will receive a (Silver Level) Attendance Certificate We have chosen 5 weeks as a benchmark as we know sometimes children will get sick and need to be absent from school for their wellbeing and the wellbeing of others. For those who are able to attain 100% attendance for the entire term however they will also get a Gold Level Attendance Certificate. We are into week 3 of our 1st 5 week block and we have 311 students headed for our 1st silver attendance certificates. 100% Attendance means no sick days, leave or unexplained absences. School business such as attending CEDP gala days and CAPTIVATE is always regarded as attendance.

CHILD PROTECTION

Dear Parents.

On some occasions your child may come home or speak to you on the playground regarding an incident that may have occurred between them and another child(ren). This is not unusual in a school of 412 children as many boys and girls are still learning the skills of negotiation, conflict resolution, compromise, effective communication and emotional regulation. If this happens and you feel that this is beyond the capacity of your child to manage if it is of a nature that needs to be referred to the school, please contact your child's classroom teacher, Mrs Benkovich or myself.

Under no circumstances is it appropriate or acceptable for you to approach a child, other than your own, to inquire about what happened - even in a manner you feel is non threatening.

Adults can be unintentionally threatening to a little boy or girl of primary school age and children can become frightened or nervous. Child Protection legislation in a school is very strict regarding these issues. I am sure that no parents would wish another parent or member of another family to approach their child(ren). The school is committed to ensuring that all matters reported are followed up within a reasonable period of time and feedback communicated. Thanking you for your cooperation in this very important safety matter.



RECENT CHANGES TO EXTENDED LEAVE (APPLICATIONS NEEDED FOR 5 DAYS OR MORE)

The Catholic Education Office have made recent changes to the application for extended leave from 10 days or more to **5 days or more**.

- Parents or carers may approach the school to seek permission for extended leave during the school term.
 Extended leave is now considered to be 5 or more days.
- Parents/Carers must complete and submit the Application for Extended Leave prior to commencing leave
 OR apply for extended leave in writing to the principal directly.
- Please note that if the child does not return to school on the specified date in the application the school
 must be notified. If the family is not contactable the Department of Education and Training must be
 informed.
- On most occasions it is in the child's best interest for all holidays to be scheduled in gazetted holiday times.

Dear Parents and Carers

Today (Tuesday), the Federal Government introduces into Parliament its new schools funding bill. In the past weeks, I have become disheartened by the ongoing war of words between the Catholic education sector and the Federal Government about what the new model will mean for Catholic systemic schools. It has become bitter with senior government ministers calling the Catholic leaders 'dishonest'. This kind of language achieves nothing.

The debate has become so hostile because despite it being three weeks since the new model was first announced, the Catholic sector, which educates 1 in 5 students across the country, still does not know what the new arrangements will mean for their schools, particularly in the long-term. This is giving rise to rumours of big fee increases as early as next year. When things are not clear, people become anxious. It does not need to be this way.

Government funding of Catholic schools does not mean that Catholic schools end up receiving more funding than government schools. When the funding provided by state and federal governments is combined with school fees and other sources of income like local fundraising, Catholic schools end up receiving around the same overall funding as government schools. Not more - around the same.

The main problem with the new model is the proposed change to how schools will be allocated funding. The government wants to fund each school according to its suburb's individual's Socio Economic Score (SES) rather than averaging out the SES scores for all Catholic schools. This is suggesting that everyone who sends their child to a Catholic school in a suburb that has a comparatively high SES can afford to pay high fees. This is wrong.

Bishop Vincent and I have no wish to place additional financial pressure on families, many of whom are already struggling to meet cost of living pressures. Regardless of where they live and the school they send their children to, parents should not be expected to absorb the kind of fee increases written about in newspapers in the past week.

Equity and fairness should sit at the heart of any funding model. The Catholic sector and the Federal Government should be able to sit down in a constructive and respectful environment to ensure that the new model is fair for all.

White I appreciate the challenges of arriving at a model that everyone can be happy with, I am hopeful that sensible debate will follow in the days ahead. Government funding should never be taken for granted, but neither should Catholic school families. I will continue to take up the issue of funding fairness with our elected representatives - local, state and national. I ask you to contact your local member and make your view very clearly known as well.

It is time to change the game. We need agreement on a model that provides clarity, fairness and certainty for all government and non-government schools.
