Dear Parents

Next Monday the Church will be celebrating the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. On this day we remember the person of Mary and the relationship we have developed with her through the many accounts of our Holy Mother through scripture. For many of us, our thoughts and devotion to Our Lady began very early in life, commencing with the Nativity Story. We learnt how brave and resilient Mary was as she travelled to Bethlehem with Joseph giving birth to Jesus in a stable. This connection continued as we heard of her relationship with Jesus in the story of Jesus at the temple, at the wedding at Cana and during Holy Week. Growing up, in my family, our Holy Mother always seemed so accessible to us, just like our own mother. Praying to her seemed very easy because we were taught that Mary is always there for us and that we could tell her anything. In a homily at Vatican City Pope Francis reminds us that Mary is, "an attentive and caring mother with whom we can entrust every desire or difficulty." Every day, at midday, all staff and students of schools in the Parramatta Diocese stop to say the Angelus. Often, the busiest part of the day, we all stop to pray to our Heavenly Mother, recalling her story and the critical role she played in the upbringing of Jesus. In this the year of Mercy we also pray the Hail Holy Queen which continues to remind us of her care and love for us. I encourage you all to say the Angelus or the Rosary with your family and to attend mass for the Feast of the Assumption. Times for masses at St Patrick's Cathedral are published in this newsletter. The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a Holy Day of Obligation.



This Monday, 15th August, the Church celebrates Mary's Assumption into heaven. Mary who was born without sin, was taken body & soul into Heaven.

We will be celebrating this very special feast and Holy Day of Obligation with Mass at 9.30am at the Cathedral. Everyone is very welcome to join us.

WORLD YOUTH DAY- KRAKOW 2016

On July 29th we began our official World Youth Day week with an Opening Mass celebrated with Cardinal Dziwisz at Blonia Park. The persistent rain wasn't enough to dampen our spirits as we joined approximately 500, 000 young people to officially open World Youth Day 2016. Cardinal Dziwisz welcomed all the youth from all "continents and nations, from the East and West, North and South of our globe". It began our week of communicating with people from all walks in the "language of the gospel"- a language of love, solidarity and peace. This week, was a week to share our faith, our experiences and our hopes with the many people we would cross paths with.



In the following days, we attended Catechesis, where a number of keynote speakers spoke including Cardinal Timothy Dolan from New York, USA. It was during Cardinal Dolans speech that we were reminded of the importance of not 'procrastinating' when saying yes to God, something that we are all guilty of in one way or another in our busy lives. He also explained that it was a time to live through Mercy and the importance of praying to Mary as an intercessor for Jesus.



Our World Youth Day pilgrimage continued as we travelled to the John Paul II Sanctuary that houses relics of St John Paul II. We then visited the Divine Mercy Shrine and the Chapel of St Faustina Kowalska, where I was able to spend time in prayer and reflection at the place St Faustina worked and had her apparition of Jesus,

"For the sake of His sorrowful passion, have mercy on us and the whole world".

On the Pope's arrival, we celebrated Mass where Pope Francis invited us to enter the hearts and lives of the poor, to be in the lives of those who don't understand and those who may hurt us; to show Mercy to those around us to fulfil our lives.

We were joined by Pope Francis on Friday for an artistic rendition of the Stations of the Cross. The theme of the Way of the Cross for the World Youth Day pilgrimage was to display the path of Mercy. It was through this rendition that the works of Mercy within and around our world were symbolised at each station.

On Saturday 30th we set out on our 22km journey to Campus Misericordiae, following in the footsteps of Jesus. This was to be the beginning of the hardest yet most fulfilling part of my two week pilgrimage. During our journey my group of 10 joined by another group endured both the physical and emotional strain of the long journey. We were meet by Polish locals who fed and watered us along the way showing us Mercy through their hospitality and compassion.



That evening at Campus Misericordiae, we were joined by Pope Francis, who led the pilgrims in a candlelight prayer vigil. The vigil was a solemn gathering where we heard from a young Syrian girl who shared moving words of her persevering faith despite her personal suffering and the suffering of her nation. This was followed by an hour of Adoration with the Blessed Sacrament. It was a truly special occasion to be praying with the Holy Father to Jesus.



After spending Saturday night on the Campus Misericordiae grounds we awoke on Sunday morning to participate in Mass celebrated by Pope Francis. Pope Francis reminded the many pilgrims that "God Loves us the way we are" and to not accept ourselves and to not live happily is like walking away from God. "God counts on you for what you are, not for what you possess". Pope Francis reminded us that it doesn't matter if you have the latest fashion trends, the latest smart phone, these things are not important. What is important is that Jesus loves YOU!

Our pilgrimage concluded on Monday with a diocesan retreat to Folwark Zalesie. This was an excellent opportunity for us to reflect on the experiences of the past two weeks. We celebrated mass and then went on for our final night in Warsaw. This was where our journey for our pilgrimage ended but this did not signify the end of this faith journey we find ourselves on.

This was a truly amazing experience and one I will never forget, especially the people I met and the places I went. World Youth Day week was an intense, spiritual and physically demanding experience. Although this meeting only lasted a few days, it was a time of decision making, a time to set new goals a time to deepen my faith and follow Jesus' way. I thank God for each and every grace he bestowed on me on my pilgrimage.

My challenge to you, how can you be the face of mercy to the people in your lives?

I would like to thank the St Patrick's community for their support, well wishes and prayers along the way.

highlight how our school is a Face of Mercy.





Pyjama Day—25th August

On Thursday 25 August we are having a Gold Coin Pyjama Day to raise money for an Aboriginal group in Mt Druitt. The money we raise will help this group continue their day to day work. Last Wednesday, Aunty Jenny Ebbsworth, Sr Naomi rsj and Br Laurie mfc spoke to staff about the challenges facing Aboriginal families and how they work to support and encourage Aboriginal people.



The organization is called Baabayn and was established by four Aboriginal elders who live in Western Sydney and know all about the ups and downs of life for Aboriginal People in the Mount Druitt area. They say:

Our main purpose is to support our people in healing from the past and building towards the future. We work as a group to support individuals, we turn no-one away, and we seek to build our people's pride in who they are, their sense of belonging, and their sense of connectedness to community and culture.

Our Aims in a Nutshell

- Nurturing of local Aboriginal people's confidence, self-esteem, spirituality and knowledge of their culture
- A supportive, healing, low-stress environment for Aboriginal people
- Support for Aboriginal people who want to network and link up
- · Lasting partnerships to help us support our people more effectively
- Assistance and advocacy for people who are struggling in their dealings with government departments, etc.
- · Healing through art and crafts.

Things We Do

EVERYDAY SUPPORT BY MEANS OF:

- Family group meetings, with services and programs (e.g. counselling and falls prevention for seniors) provided by a range of government and other organisations
- Homework club every Tuesday (run with the help of Kenthurst Parish's Social Justice Committee)
- Being there for families when need arises (e.g. assistance with funerals) Supporting young mums and helping families to stay together.

BIG, ONE-OFF EVENTS, SUCH AS:

- Annual Christmas party at the Nurragingy reserve, with gifts for our communities'children
- · Annual weekend at Gerringong for children and their families.




