Dear Parents,

Next Sunday is Father's Day and is a time when the family celebrates the love of these very special men in the family. The role of fathers seems to have changed over the years. Many in our grandparents or great grandparents generation were used to fathers being the sole 'bread winners', and

because of this common situation in society during that time, fathers were not as visible in all aspects of family life, as they are today.

My own father for example had three jobs; his week job and then two on the weekends. When we were young we spent most of the time with our mum, however when the weekend came it was dad's job to drive the family to outings, such as the beach or visiting family. His role in the family was very 'traditional', working hard, building a business, house maintenance, car maintenance, garden maintenance, mowing, using tools, renovating and helping relatives. He loved soccer, fishing, playing with us in the back yard, tinkering in the garage, watching war movies, watching boxing and relaxing on the lounge reading the Readers Digest. He had a special chair and enjoyed coming home from work to find a hot pot of tea ready before dinner. Our father never came to school, very rarely helped out with homework and usually was the one mum used as a threat if we were being naughty. In our eyes however he was strong, clever, hard working, gentle and wise. What is curious is that although he was always busy he was a steady presence in the family. We knew him and he knew us.

Pope Francis passionately speaks about the importance of a father's presence in the family. He encourages fathers to be present by their wife's side; sharing the joys and pains, hard work and hope. He speaks about the importance of being there for the children as they grow up. Pope Francis reminds fathers that a father needs to be there for his kids, "when they play and when they work hard, when they are playful and when they are distressed, when they are communicative and when they are taciturn, when they are daring and when they are afraid, when they have strayed and when they have found their way again," he says.

Pope Francis also makes the distinction between fathers being present and being controlling and warns fathers that being too controlling can be suffocating for their children. He encourages fathers to correct and guide their children without demeaning or demoralizing them, protecting them at all costs. Just like the father in the gospel account of the prodigal son', Pope Francis encourages fathers to know how to forgive sincerely from the heart and to be patient and merciful.

Finally Pope Francis concludes that a wise and mature father will be able to say to his children after they've grown: "I taught you things that you didn't know, I corrected errors that you did not see. I let you feel an affection that was both deep and discreet that perhaps you did not fully recognize when you were young and unsure and I gave you witness of rigor and willpower that perhaps you did not understand when you just wanted complicity and protection."

1.15pm - 2.45pm - Australian Bush Dances




- We ask that the students come dressed as a pioneering Australian.




ATTENDANCE/ABSENCES

Children are required by legislation to attend school each day, and we are required by law to keep records of each child's absences from school. For this reason if your child is unable to attend school, a note must be sent the day the child returns to school giving the reason for the absence. This can be done by letter or by using the school's Skoolbag App (please see instructions below).

The absence needs to be explained within 7 days of the absence or it will be changed to unexplained and cannot be altered if the note is received after that time. All absences are shown on the child's report.

REACHING OUT TO REFUGEES

In the past 70 years over 800,000 Australians who once were refugees have made great contributions to Australia and have enriched the fabric of our lives. They left their home countries to seek refuge elsewhere because of war, persecution or as was the case with my forebears, because they could not feed their families due to famine. The reasons people seek asylum or refuge in Australia today are not too different from years past. The response of our country has changed.

"Governments have a responsibility to manage migration flows, but the Australian Government's current approach is harsh and should change.

The Catholic Church opposes mandatory detention and offshore detention because these policy responses do not respect the dignity of people seeking our help. It is imperative that the dignity of the human person must always come first."

It takes courage to be a refugee:

As people who have faced persecution because of who they are (their race, nationality or membership of a persecuted group)

or what they believe (their religion or political opinion), refugees need courage:

- The courage not to deny identity or beliefs in the face of persecution.
- The courage to leave all that is familiar and step into the unknown in search of peace.
- The courage to keep going in the face of devastating loss, difficulty and despair.
- The courage to begin again, to work hard and to maintain hope in an unfamiliar land.





It takes courage to speak out against injustice:

In a world where refugees experience persecution in their countries of origin and often face discrimination, difficulty and rejection in places where they seek refuge, speaking out often requires courage.

We acknowledge and celebrate the dedication and bravery of refugee leaders, advocates and citizens who draw attention to violations of human rights, support people at their time of greatest need and challenge callous indifference to the suffering of others.

Australians are encouraged to celebrate the best aspects of our nation's welcome of refugees, frankly acknowledge unjust treatment of asylum seekers and refugees and commit to working together to ensure that we do better.

HOW CAN WE HELP REFUGEES?

At St Patrick's we are going to help the Jesuit Refugee Service, called Arrupe Place, which provides assistance to refugees living in Western Sydney. Arrupe Place has a **foodbank** which provides free fortnightly supplements to refugee families to assist them with their grocery needs. This allows them to spend some of their grocery money on things like rent, bills and medical care.

We are appealing for donations of non-perishable food. *Of course it must be within the used by date.* Items will be collected in the classrooms.

Financial Donations

Donations can be made to assist the Jesuit Réfugee Service for asylum seekers in the community. Here are some examples of how financial donations will assist people and their families:

- \$50 could provide a vulnerable family with a supermarket voucher, enabling them to buy essentials such as rice, flour, tea, and fresh vegetables for the week.
- \$150 would provide a fortnightly allowance for the food, travel, and medical needs of asylum seekers living in the JRS Blaiket Shelter in Elizabeth Bay
- \$450 would assist a family seeking asylum with their basic fortnightly living expenses; including food, travel, and medical needs.
- \$40 would pay for an Opal Card to help pay for weekly train and bus fares to get asylum seekers to and from important appointments with lawyers, doctors, and potential employers.
