

# 23rd November 2017 Term 4 Week 7

#### Dear Parents,

In a few weeks time you will be receiving your child's Semester 2 Report. As per the last few years the report that St Patrick's Parramatta is using is the Catholic Education, Diocese of Parramatta Online Report. The majority of schools in the Parramatta Diocese use this report. Below is a summary of the key features.

• The reports follow the A – E common grade scale for the 7 Key Learning Areas for Grades 1 to 6 (The Common Grade Scale developed with the Board of Studies contains descriptions and associated grades A-E or equivalent words. The scale describes; The depth of **knowledge and understanding** and the **range of skills** that students working at that standard typically show. In line with the National Curriculum the strands within the subject are not reported separately. Knowledge and skills are seen as fully integrated eg, a student uses the skills of talking/listening, reading and writing in composing and responding to text within the English Curriculum. Computer skills and the use of the Library are also not seen as separate from the key areas of learning but rather integral tools with associated skills within each of them.

• Each report indicates the **effort** demonstrated by the students in each Key Learning Area. This can often be a difficult area to assess so the standard for reporting for effort is based on what behaviours, attitudes and learning habits the student **demonstrates**.

• Information about the distribution of grades across the year – that is, how many students were awarded an A, how many a B and so on, is indicated.

- Comments have been included for the three key areas of Religious Education, English and Mathematics.
- A Grading is given for Personal and Social Behaviours and Learning Habits
- A general comment is given at the end of the report.

• In keeping with Government guidelines, Kindergarten reports do not use an A – E common grade scale as they are still emerging as learners.

• A record of Absences and Partial Absences is given at the end of the report. It is worthy of note that significant absences and/or partial absences can have a significant impact on a child's learning and thus the report results.

• Information regarding NAPLAN results can be found on the cover of Year 3 and 5 reports.

When looking at your child's report it is important that this is seen as a snapshot of how your child is doing at this point in time. It needs to be read in conjunction with other important tracking information. Some of these include: student portfolios, teacher comments, parent teacher interviews throughout the year, student work samples, student personal reflections, general indicators of progress and improvement and information about student effort. It is also important to note that in order for the children to be confident about making further progress they need to be encouraged to 'own' their progress or lack of desirable growth. Dr Carol Dweck, author of 'Mindset How You Can Fulfil Your Potential' encourages parents and teachers to focus on a growth mindset by not looking solely at performance. She reminds us that "Every word and action from parent to child sends a message." When you speak to your child about their report, "... tune in to the messages you are sending. Are they messages that say: "You have permanent traits and I am judging them?" Or are they messages that say; "You're a developing person and I'm interested in you development?"

#### Asking questions that may assist include:

What is this report telling you about what you learned this year? What does it tell you about how you handled making mistakes and learning from them? What is it saying about how hard you tried? What is the report telling you about what you enjoy doing? What is the report telling you about what you don't enjoy? What is the report telling you about how you embraced the opportunities for learning and growth given to you? When, where and how will you embark on your plan to continue to improve? Is this report a true reflection of your ability and if not, why have you not shown your teacher what you can really think and do? How can you change this next year?

## SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT REMINDERS RE MORNING AND AFTERNOON PICK UP/DROP OFF

### Dear Parents

Please find below some important reminders regarding Road Safety Procedures around the school

## BAGS IN BOOT

In the afternoons, can we encourage you to ask the children to enter the car and to place their bags on their laps or on the floor, instead of asking them to go behind the car to place their bags in the boot. Our safety recommendation is driven by our observation of children dangerously going in between cars, keeping in mind what could happen if cars accidently move forward. We ask you to seriously consider this recommendation. Thank you!

#### CROSSING - NEAR ACCIDENT TUESDAY MORNING (21/11/17)

Parents this morning it has come to my attention that one of our students was nearly hit by a car (TWICE) on Ross Street. This was due to the fact that the child crossed the road behind his car, **not at the crossing**. As previously communicated this is a very dangerous situation. Can I appeal to all parents dropping their children off at the OLMC side of Ross Street in the morning or picking up in the afternoon to please **always use the crossing**. This is a recommendation even when you are with them as it is good role modelling. I know you will all agree that the few extra minutes it takes for this safe procedure is worth avoiding a potential accident and possibly saving a life.

## MORNING AND AFTERNOON PICK UP



I have just had a number of conversations with members of the Parramatta City Council regarding the morning and afternoon pick up conditions. They have informed me that from now on parents will need to be vigilant about following the road signs including the Trott Street 'No Stopping" sign. In other words all parents will need to drive around the block and not block Trott Street. Some parents may wish to park. Failure to obey these road signs may result in the issuing of fines.

Can I please ask you from now on to obey the conditions of the road signs until we can come up with a better solution for the safe pick up and drop off of our children. The council will be soon conducting a survey to gather your thoughts on the topic. In the meantime I am asking for your cooperation in this matter.

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## NOTIFICATION REGARDING GATE CLOSURE IN 2018

To ensure full compliance with the school's timetable hours (8.50am to 3.00pm) please be aware that as from **Term 1, 2018** the main gate will be locked at the official gazetted school start time, that is at 8.50am. 
