Dear Parents,

Over the last few weeks you may have had the opportunity to watch some of the events from the Pyeong Chang 2018 Winter Olympics. Whilst I do not get the chance to see all disciplines in this International Competition I love to watch the variety of sports being displayed at such a high level. I'm sure, like me, you must marvel at not only how very strong and brave these athletes are but also at their level of commitment. For many of these men and women and sometimes young teenagers, getting to this point in their sporting careers has taken many many years of dedication and sacrifice.

Whilst the results and medal tally is interesting what I love the most is the strength of human character visible in victory and defeat. The other night I watched with enormous pride Australian skier David Morris. Mr Morris missed out on getting into the next round because he did not land his jump cleanly and was marked down by the judges. To make things worse another athlete China's, Jia Zongyang scored higher than the Australian skier, even though many commentators reported that they felt that his score was inflated. Jia Zongyang then went on to win a silver medal. I can only imagine how tempting and human it would have been for Mr Morris to complain and whine about what had happened and how his rival had unfairly 'bumped' him off the qualifying list. But to my surprise this did not happen. Instead he demonstrated a quality to be admired by all and one to be emulated - humility. In an interview with a Channel 7 reporter Mr Morris expressed his disappointment, but his reflections revealed an amazingly resilient and healthy attitude. He was guoted to have said,

"It is what it is. It's a judged sport. Sometimes it [hurts]. Sometimes it's in our favour. We don't complain when it's in our favour." He also referred to how his upbringing helped him handle difficult situations. He remembered how his parents taught him how to lose and what is truly important. "My silver medal at Sochi stands out to people. Everyone likes to see their athletes do really well. But I don't think the memory of a medal lasts as long as a reputation, and I think people's memory of PyeongChang will last a lot longer than my silver medal, because they saw an action, a thought process, and a way of doing things that needs to be shown in sport more often." He continued to say,"I know that sounds like I'm talking myself up, but for me it's normal. I was brought up really well. I was taught to lose properly. I was taught to congratulate people who'd beaten me and understand that you can't be the best on the day, every single day."

What a great message for our children. How can we encourage this life - giving attitude?

ICE BLOCKS



AFTERNOON PICK UP - NEW SIGNAGE

I am very pleased to report that the new signage on Trott Street has now been installed by Parramatta City Council. This means that our school community are now legally permitted to wait on Trott Street **from 3:00pm** as part of the school pick up procedure. I ask all drivers to adhere to all road rules and signage and to follow the guidelines below:

- Please follow all signage
- Please ensure all driveways are kept clear at all times to allow exit and entry to the school neighbours
- Family signs need to be large and clear so that the teachers on duty can call out names from a distance. Parents are asked to assist the teachers to keep the flow of traffic happening so as to prevent unnecessary delay. Clear signage is critical to enabling this flow.

Know your traffic signs

• Please do not line up in front of the school until the start of duty at 3pm. All drivers must circle the block until this time. Failure to adhere to this rule may result in a fine.

I wish to thank parents for your cooperation and the Parramatta City Council for assisting the school in developing an effective and safe pick up procedure. Thank you to parents for your feedback.

I appeal to all drivers to continue to work together with the school staff on duty to ensure the safe dismissal of all students and to minimize the stress to the teachers who often sacrifice comfort to undertake this duty.

Many thanks to those who submitted responses to last week's writing prompt! The teachers had some great conversations, and I bet you did too!


Our writing prompt this week is: Your parents have decided that you can decorate your bedroom however you like. Be creative, be scientific, be as inventive as you can be! There are no limits!

ENROLMENTS FOR 2018 KINDERGARTEN ARE NOW OPEN

Enrolment packs for Kindergarten 2018 are available from the school between the hours of 9am -3pm Monday to Friday.

When you return the enrolment you will need to bring your child's original Birth Certificate, Baptismal Certificate, Passports (parent's and child's if born overseas), Immunization Certificates and proof of address (council rates, drivers licence). We will

photo copy these and return them to you at this time.

Enrolment forms are required to be returned by 31st March 2018.

ENROLMENT CRITERIA

Who can enrol in a Catholic school?

Children whose fifth birthday occurs on or before 31 July are eligible for enrolment for Kindergarten that year. By law, all children must be enrolled in school by their sixth birthday. For more information on the Diocesan guidelines for enrolment please see www.parra.catholic.edu.au

What if my child already attends a Catholic primary school in the Diocese?

A child who has completed primary education in a Catholic parish-based primary school will usually be offered continuity of enrolment in a Catholic secondary school. If no places exist at the chosen school, Catholic Education's Director System Performance will assist families to enrol in another Catholic secondary school in the Diocese.



Anxiety is an emotion commonly experienced by everyone when faced with challenging situations. School life has daily challenges for students needing to be able to organise themselves, and demonstrate previous learning whilst acquiring new learning. These attempts are frequently observed by classmates and in many instances evaluated by teachers. Students with learning difficulties are likely to experience greater challenges relative to their peers. Research suggests a higher prevalence of anxiety in children with learning difficulties which is partially related to these extra life challenges they face.

This workshop aims to increase parents', teachers' and other professionals' understanding of anxiety in children and adolescents, and to provide a repertoire of cognitive and behavioural strategies that can be used to support them in managing their anxiety at home and in school.
