Uniforms/ Haircuts

Dear Parents,

As the weather starts getting warmer we thought it was a perfect time to remind our school community about the school's protocols around hair cuts and appropriate hair attire. As is outlined below boys hair should be of an even and regular cut and girls hair ribbons should be green.

Please be mindful of this protocol when attending the hairdresser or barber shop. I know it is difficult to go against what is currently trending, however by enrolling in our school you have also agreed to the protocols outlined below.

Please have the conversation with your child if you believe their current hairstyle does not conform to our school's outlines, than adjust the cut or style as needed, over the holidays. Thanking you for your continued support regarding this area.

UNIFORM

- Full school uniform is to be worn at all times.
- Uniforms and shoes should be clean and neat.
- School hats are to be worn when outside buildings.
- Girls hair ribbons should be green.
- Girls long hair must be plaited or tied back.
- Boys are to have hair cut neatly, above the collar, and of an even and regular cut.
- The use of hair gel or hair dye is not permitted.
- No nail polish is to be worn.
- Jewellery is not permitted apart from a wristwatch, sleepers or small plain studs in pierced ears.

From the start of term 4 all students will be wearing their full summer uniform including their school hat.

The proven benefits of reading with your child

Parents and carers who read aloud with children in a secure, safe and comfortable context motivate their children to read. Parents' perceptions, values, attitudes, and expectations play an important role in influencing their children's attitudes toward reading, and subsequent literacy development. When children share a book with someone who makes them feel special, the attitude that reading is pleasurable is transferred to other reading encounters.



Relationship building

At the core of reading is a relationship and it is the bond between children and parents that is enhanced through reading together. It only takes ten minutes a day to build this relationship.

Children's reading improves

The research is conclusive: When parents successfully support their children's literacy learning from an early age, everyone benefits. When teachers and parents work together to support children's reading and academic success, learning outcomes for all children improve.

Children read more

Students who read with their parents are better prepared for school. They begin school with knowledge of book language and familiarity with concepts of print. They understand how books work and have many more exposures to text types and vocabulary.

Children's self-esteem improves

Knowing someone cares enough to take time out of a busy schedule to give you undivided attention around a book makes a significant difference to how students perceive themselves as learners and readers. When parents show an interest in their children's learning, children respond positively.

Reading unites families through shared stories

When a family reads together, stories form a common ground for communicating. Stories bind families and help students make sense of where they fit in the world.

Not only does parent involvement have a specific and profound impact on children's reading, but also on children's language and literacy learning in general. It is through interactions with parents and carers that children learn new vocabulary, seek clarification of new understandings, and learn to comprehend their expanding worlds. Talk is the key to reading and writing success. Talking with children (walking to school, at the table, in the car, bedtime) has a significant effect on literacy learning in general.

Cricket NSW

On Monday 23.9.19 we had two visitors that came to school to teach us skills in cricket. Their names where Sabrina and Cassandra and the Year 4 classes had lots of fun with them.

We learnt how to play Rolling Soccer and in the game you roll a ball to each player in your team and try to hit the stumps with the ball, but when you have the ball you can't move and if you fumble or throw the ball the other team gets the ball. Another game we

played was Catch Tennis which is basically when you throw the ball to the opposing team and if they drop the ball the other team gets a point. Another way you can play is when the other team drops the ball, that player is out or eliminated and if all the players on your team is out, you have lost the match. Also another way to play catch tennis is when you catch the ball then you are out and who ever loses all their team mates first wins the match.

After recess we played a game that taught us how to bowl a cricket ball and for your team to win you need to knock down 3 of the wickets and hit 3 cones. After that, we played a game called Rapid Fire and it was played with 4G against 4B and this game was played by one team fielding and the other team batting. There were 2 people batting at one time and they each had 3 cricket balls to hit and once all the 6 balls are hit the fielding team would run and have to set up the 6 balls how they were before, while the fielding team does this the batters try to get as many runs as they can from one stump too the other tapping it with their bat. At the end of the game when every batter is done hitting the balls then they add up all their runs. After that, the fielding team switches with the batters and they have another match and at the end who ever has the most runs wins.

The last game we played was a game to practise our catching and awareness of where the ball is going to go. If you don't catch the ball you are out but if you catch the ball you advance to the next round and every round it gets harder and harder. Who ever is the last two people that are left in the game win and get a prize.

In the end we all cooperated with each other and respected Sabrina and Cassandra while we were playing games and having fun. Thankyou Mrs Masefield and Mr Baird for letting us play. Also we thank Sabrina and Cassandra for running our games, teaching us new skills in cricket and new games.
