

Dear Parents and Caregivers

Continuing the theme of Reading Comprehension and literacy terms, this newsletter will focus on one of the most important and difficult skills required for effective reading - Inferring.

Simply put, Inferring is the ability to figure out what the author is communicating to the reader, from clues in the text.

For many children, words can be very sneaky; they can change meaning depending on the context or the words around them. Consider this example reference from a document prepared by Debbie Draper, DECS Curriculum Consultant, Northern Adelaide:

The word **ate** means different things in each of these sentences.

- The boy **ate** the apple in the pie. (took in solid food as nourishment)
- The acid **ate** the metal. (caused to rust or disintegrate)
- His guilt **ate** into him. (produced worry or anxiety)
- The stapler **ate** staples. (used up)

The analysis of words is only one challenge for readers. They must also learn to create personal meaning from the text by combining it with the relevant prior knowledge. This is quite a complex skill and as mentioned in a previous newsletter the richer the experiences the children have, the easier it is for readers to make this link.

How can I help my child to improve their ability to make inferences?

- Give children many opportunities to practice. Show them a tool eg a potato peeler or masher and ask them what it is used for. Show them a potato and see if they can make the link.
- Play this guessing game. Give the children the following scenarios and ask them to infer what could be happening (Suggestions in brackets but there are many other possibilities)
 - Sue blew out the candles and got presents. (Sue's birthday)
 - Mary plays her flute for 2 hours every day. (She is part of a band or is preparing for a performance)
 - The boat drifted in the middle of the lake. (the boat was unattended and came off its moorings)
 - John went running into the street without looking. (John was in a hurry)
 - Rasheeta was the star pitcher but she had a broken finger. (Was Rasheeta going to play today?)
 - We bought tickets and some popcorn. (At the movies)
 - I forgot to set my alarm clock last night. (Was late for school or work)
 - When I woke up, there were branches and leaves all over the yard. (It was a windy or stormy night)
 - Yesterday we cleaned out our desks and took everything home. (The last day of the year at school)
 - Everyone stopped when the referee blew the whistle. (The end of the game)
- Model how you make inferences based on what the author says.
- Ask your child to make predictions about what she/he is reading and explain the reason for that prediction.
- Use the cartoon section of the newspaper to help your child understand the humor in the comic strip.
- Encourage your child to talk about his/her response to what is read.
- Honour your child's thinking about what is read.
- Talk about the inferences your child makes during the day (when to ask a parent for permission to do something and when not to ask).
- Point out the inferences that are made based on a person's body language (smile, hands on hips, slouch).
- Play word games that require inferential thinking (Twenty Questions).
- Make inferences about unfamiliar vocabulary words.
- Share riddles and riddle books.
- Play charades.

Wishing you many moments of happy inferring.

Uniforms/ Haircuts

As the weather starts getting warmer we thought it was a perfect time to remind our school community about the school's protocols around hair cuts and appropriate hair attire. As is outlined below boy's hair should be of an even and regular cut and girls hair ribbons should be green.

Please be mindful of this protocol when attending the hairdresser or barber shop. I know it is difficult to go against what is currently trending, however by enrolling in our school you have also agreed to the protocols outlined below.

Please have the conversation with your child if you believe their current hairstyle does not conform to our school's outlines, than adjust the cut or style as needed, over the weekend. Next week, parents will be contacted by the student's classroom teacher if we deem the haircut to be unsuitable.

UNIFORM

- Full school uniform is to be worn at all times.
- Uniforms and shoes should be clean and neat.
- School hats are to be worn when outside buildings.
- Girls hair ribbons should be green.
- Girls long hair must be plaited or tied back.
- Boys are to have hair cut neatly, above the collar, and of an even and regular cut.
- The use of hair gel or hair dye is not permitted.
- No nail polish is to be worn.
- Jewellery is not permitted apart from a wristwatch, sleepers or small plain studs in pierced ears.

From the start of term 4 all students will be wearing their full summer uniform including their school hat.

Pedestrian Safety Before & After School

Just a reminder that we have a designated Pedestrian Crossing outside our school. We have noticed a number of parents crossing their children outside the school gate from the OLMC side of Ross St, often opening the car door into traffic. To Parents and Carers



NUMERACY TIPS TO HELP YOUR CHILD EVERY DAY K to Yr 2

9. MEASURING THINGS

Understanding measurement and scale are crucial to your child's understanding of maths. Here are some tips and activities:

- » Use a wall measuring chart to measure the height of people in your family.
- » Talk to your child about objects around them and help them judge which is bigger or smaller, taller or shorter.
- » Cut a piece of string for your child – any length will do. Use the string to measure the objects in your house to find out what is longer or shorter than your 'string measuring tape'. Ask your child to identify anything that is the same length.
- » Explore other ways of measuring, such as using a cup, jug, teaspoon, icy pole sticks, footprints or hand lengths.
- » Help your child to build a tower of blocks that is taller than a favourite toy. Ask your child to count the total blocks to measure the height of the tower.
- » Estimate and measure who can jump the furthest, or stand on one foot for a longer period, or how many buttons might fill a jar.
- » Explore the size of different containers by pouring and filling. Estimate, then check to see which holds more or less.
- » Notice changes in the weather and the time of day. Use an old bottle and create a 'rain gauge' to measure and monitor how much it rains.



Your least favourite dish?


My least favourite dish is brussel sprouts.
